Dumfries & Galloway Youngster Wins Prize at Rotary Young Photographer of the Year Competition

A photograph of recycling bins reflected in a car mirror won first prize in the 12-15 year old age category at an awards ceremony in Stirling City Chambers on Wednesday 16th June. The photograph was taken by 13 year old Alastair Clements-Paton from Castle Douglas.

The Young Photographer of the Year 2010 Competition, which was run by Rotary International in Scotland and supported by Keep Scotland Beautiful, offered youngsters who live within Scotland the opportunity to enter their photographs in one of three age group categories – under 12, 12-15 and 16-18. The theme for this years' competition was 'Are we Waste Aware', which allowed a broad interpretation of subject matter, and judges were looking for imagination and style, as well as technical merit, content and composition.

The judges felt that Alastair's entry, titled 'Recycle', had grasped the competition's theme extremely well and was a very vivid and impressive shot. For his efforts, Alastair was presented with a certificate from Keep Scotland Beautiful, and also won a £25 voucher from Jessops.

Donna Niven, Programme Manager at Keep Scotland Beautiful said, "Keep Scotland Beautiful was delighted to support the Rotary Young Photographer 2010 Scotland Competition, and we were thrilled that the theme of 'Are we Waste Aware' was chosen for this years' competition.
